been challenges for Threads of Life too — all our in-person family forums were cancelled for a second year, Steps for Life walks were all virtual, and many fundraisers could not happen. But not only did our partners, funders and sponsors stick with us, many increased their support, and new partners came on board! Not only did our volunteers continue to give their time, but many also came up with creative new ways to help, and new volunteers joined! While some revenues declined, with assistance from government funding programs, we were able to keep our staff, and in fact, late in the year, we filled two vacant positions for development coordinators — welcome to Shari Hinz in Western Canada and Christine Kennedy-Babineau in Atlantic Canada.

Like so many of us, the board of directors got used to meeting via Zoom and has worked hard the past two years to ensure policies are up to date, our governance is effective, and the organization has the resources it needs to be successful. Overflowing with Gratitude



ratitude doesn't always come naturally — that's why our parents had to remind us to say 'thank you'. Then researchers discovered that not only is gratitude polite, it's also good for our mood and mental health. Harvard Medical School tells us true gratitude is more than just the action of saying 'thanks' — it is appreciation for all that we receive. Acknowledging all that goodness helps us see that the source lies at least partly outside ourselves, and connects us to something larger. Many people have adopted a practice of daily gratitude, responding to gratitude prompts or noting three things they're grateful for in a gratitude journal. At Threads of Life, as we look back over the past year, we have no need for prompts, and we can't limit ourselves to three things — we are overflowing with gratitude! Family members — both new and those who have been with us for years - entrusted their stories and their healing to Threads of Life. Our volunteers and partners ensured that our programs could continue in spite of the pandemic, and those programs are making an impact, helping families on their journey. We are grateful for all the trust, commitment, passion, and support we have witnessed throughout 2021. Consider this annual report our gratitude journal.

Our Work Supporting Families

We are grateful for:

- The 192 new family members who found Threads of Life during 2021.
- Our partners, who helped almost half of those families find us.



Work-related tragedies continued to occur in 2021, in spite of, and even because of the pandemic. Last year, 192 new family members found their way to Threads of Life looking for support — an increase of 50 per cent over the previous year's total. At Threads of Life, we don't reach out directly to families — they find us through our partners, through the media, through Steps for Life and through web searches. Partners like the workers' compensation boards, ministries of labour and safety associations are key - roughly 45 per cent of new families say they discovered Threads of Life because of information passed on by one of those organizations.

We are thankful that our core programs could deliver support to our new and existing family members, even when we couldn't be face to face.

Through our Volunteer Family program, many of those new families were matched with a trained peer guide who lives with a similar tragedy. More than 70 Volunteer Family Guides have been trained to support other families, and those relationships are not just for brand-new family members — many extend for years and evolve into friendships. We are grateful for this adaptable model of peer support and for the volunteers who faithfully reach out to others.

We are grateful for:

- 230 family members, partners, facilitators, volunteers and staff who attended virtual family forums.
- · 218 attendees who shared, learned and supported each other at online Families Connect sessions.

"A have come back from each forum with so much positivity." - family member survey comment We missed being together for our annual Family Forums in 2021, but appreciated that we could gather online - 230 people participated in one of the three regional forums. And we're extragrateful that we are able to plan for in-person forums in 2022!



We wouldn't exactly say we're grateful for the pandemic, but we are thankful that sometimes, innovation is born of necessity. When in-person events were cancelled by the pandemic, we were able to move some programs — like our family forums - online, and created a brand new service: monthly online workshops we call FamiliesConnect. The topics ranged from self-care to photography to the popular "ask a therapist" session, and more than 200 participants attended workshops over the year, including a number of families new to Threads of Life. At the start of each session, participants introduce themselves and are encouraged to say the name of the loved one who was injured, killed or made ill by workplace tragedy — a moment of connection they have told us means a great deal to them. FamiliesConnect gives members a combination of practical coping skills and less-tangible things: the opportunity to be heard and to realize they are not alone.


Our Work Prevention Outreach

We are grateful for:

- Family members who shared their stories in Day of Mourning videos, which reached 11,400 people.
- All those who listened and heard our 51 Speaker's Bureau presentations.

We are thankful for all the progress that's been made in health and safety over the years, but Threads of Life and our family members won't rest until workplace tragedies are eliminated. One of ways we tackle that is by helping people understand the impact on a family, community and workplace when something does go wrong on the job. That's why Day of Mourning is such an important day for us - not only is it a day to mark those lives changed forever, it's also an opportunity to move closer to our vision. In 2021, while in-person events weren't possible, four of our family members shared their stories on video, and combined with our recorded Day of Mourning ceremony, these videos reached 11,400 people.

A handful of in-person Speaker's Bureau presentations were possible, but the demand for virtual presentations grew over the year, and we are grateful that while these may not have the impact of a face-to-face speech, they can reach more people - those in remote regions, workers on the night shift, or companies with multiple sites. Though the virtual element makes it difficult to track, we do know that thousands of people heard our speakers' stories in 2021. We know the impact of those stories is to change behaviours and safety cultures.

Our Work: Steps for Life

How could we feel anything but gratitude (and awe!) for the committed volunteers across Canada who came up with creative ways to carry on with Steps for Life-Walking for Families of Workplace Tragedy events in spite of the pandemic? While a few small groups were able to gather outside with physical distancing, Steps for Life was overall a virtual event in 2021. Volunteers hosted virtual openings on a variety of platforms, combined with video greetings, virtual scavenger hunts, online auctions and Facebook live concerts. Threads of Life staff shipped hundreds of t-shirts to teams in advance, and participants shared photos and videos of themselves out completing their steps. Their commitment and passion for health and safety was an inspiration!

"When I was injured at work, it was months before I was able to walk again, and that is part of why Steps for Life is important to me. Not only because of the programs and supports that it helps fund for Threads of Life, but also for how it symbolizes the strength and perseverance of everyone who has suffered a workplace tragedy and the loved ones of those who never got the chance to tell their own stories."





COVID-19 and Threads of Life financial statements:

The outbreak of Coronavirus Disease 2019, or COVID-19, has spread across the globe and is impacting worldwide economic activity. This global pandemic poses the risk that the association or its members, employees, contractors, suppliers, and other partners may be unable to conduct regular activities for an indefinite period of time. While it is not possible at this time to estimate the impact that COVID-19 could have on the association's activities, the continued spread of COVID-19 and the measures taken by the federal, provincial, and municipal governments to contain its impact could adversely impact the association's activities, financial condition or results of operations. Specifically, the association had to move its "Steps for Life" event from in person to virtual in 2020 and 2021, as well as cancel all in-person family forums and move them to one virtual forum. This caused a reduction in revenues, which was partially offset by a reduction in expenses to run the events. To further offset the revenue decreases that occurred, the association applied for and received \$205,984 (2020 - \$295,477) from the government for wage and rent subsidies. The extent to which the COVID-19 outbreak impacts the association's future financial results will depend on future developments that are highly uncertain and cannot be predicted, including new information that may emerge concerning the spread of the virus and government actions.
